Course Overview: This course explores the question "Who am I?" and examines the subtleties and layers that create identity. Students evaluate what forces (childhood, heritage, nature or nurture, conformity/ non-conformity, place, time, education, ethics) have shaped their unique perspectives. Several genres of texts are analyzed, including novels, short stories, poems, plays, and film. Students question, interpret, and make judgments about texts, thereby boosting student empowerment. They write in multiple genres, and use writing as both a way to learn and as a means of expression. Students will practice critical literacy and collaboration skills as learning and engagement strategies for both reading and writing. Over the course of the school year, students will read and view challenging content that will warrant serious conversation about a variety of issues. This course meets students where they are and helps them to both grow and thrive as learners.

Vision of the Successful Student and Core Competencies:

A successful student in this course will...

- use a variety of reading strategies to respond and interpret texts.
- write in a wide variety of genres; experience different writing processes; and use a variety of writing techniques.
- challenge the attitudes, values, and beliefs that lie beneath the surface of a text (critical literacy).
- consider the purpose for the text and the writer's motives; hold multiple interpretations to a single text.
- value the ideas of others, share ideas in class discussions, and develop skills as a peer responder.

Materials and Resources to Support Student Learning: Novels, poems, plays, non-fiction texts, and handouts will be distributed in class. Students will be expected to bring a charged chromebook, notebooks, pens or pencils, and any other required materials to class on a daily basis. In addition to assigned classroom texts, please visit your teacher's Google Classroom for useful information and links that support student learning.
