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Course Overview: In this course, students will investigate what defines popular culture through analysis of literary narratives and contemporary media. Students will study a variety of texts exploring past and present politics, literature, music, film, and sports. Examining popular culture provides a lens to understand diverse perspectives, and allows us to consider the values and experiences of humans around the United States.

Possible novels/ excerpts include but are not limited to: *The AutoBiography of Malcolm X, The Handmaid's Tale, Looking For Alaska,* and others. Parents are encouraged to peruse the assigned novels and contact the teacher with any concerns.

Materials and Resources to Support Student Learning:

Students will be given novels, poems, non-fiction texts, as well as handouts. Students will be expected to bring chromebooks, texts and any other required materials to class on a daily basis. In addition to assigned classroom texts, Google Classroom will provide useful links that support students' learning. Parents are encouraged to peruse the assigned novels and contact the teacher if you have any concerns.
