Course Overview: In this course students self-select and read a wide range of young adult literature short stories and novels written by authors representing diverse perspectives and styles. Students will explore social issues that are reflected in the texts, to consider and debate the value they hold in our current society. With a focus on real life issues, oral and written communication skills will be reinforced through literary analysis within and across the texts.

Possible novels include but are not limited to: A Heart in a Body in The World, Concrete Rose, Dragon Hoops, It's Kind of a Funny Story, Moxie, The Perks of Being a Wallflower, The Prince and The Dressmaker, and others.

The teacher may use video adaptations of the novels to further support student learning.

Parents/Guardians are encouraged to peruse the assigned novels and contact the teacher with any concerns.
