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## **Course Overview:**

Sociology is the study of how individuals behave in relation to groups and institutions. Students will explore the nature of culture, how it is transmitted, and the effects of the major social institutions of family, education, and religion on American society. Also investigated are the formation and enforcement of norms, values, and the implications of social inequities. Additionally, the dynamics of social change will be explored including an examination of factors that work to promote the forces that resist change.

- o Assess the role of deviance in society.
- o Examine how people and/or groups resist or promote change in society.
- o Demonstrate effective literacy skills by reading and writing including the literature selections by the teacher.
