Course Overview: The UConn Economics course(s) (ECE) are designed to introduce students to many of the key principles and ideas of economics. Students will study terms and concepts from Microeconomics (1st Semester) such as supply and demand as well as economic theories and systems. Topics from Macroeconomics (2nd Semester) such as economic performance, economic challenges, government, and fiscal policy will also be studied. Students will complete independent research, complete projects and assignments throughout the semester. These are TWO separate semester courses (Micro – Fall) & (Macro – Spring) and have a fee (\$150 each) and potentially receiving a grade/credit for one or two UCONN courses: Economics 1201 (Microeconomics) & Economics 1202 (Macroeconomics) – this will be addressed on first day of class.
