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Course Overview: This course will focus on United States History from post-reconstruction to the present. Topics of study include: Industrialization, Becoming a World Power, Roaring 20's to the New Deal, Civil Rights, Cold War and Entering a New Era. This course will allow students to think critically about the vital issues that face them as U.S. citizens. To achieve this goal, students will develop competence in chronological thinking, historical comprehension of primary and secondary sources, historical research, interpretation and justifying their point of view through oral and written expression.

Vision of the Successful Student And Core Competencies:

The student will understand:

- Literacy skills needed to demonstrate effective reading and writing in the subject area.
- Did the Industrial Revolution improve or lower the working and living conditions of Americans?
- During the late 19th and early 20th centuries America emerged as a world power, which method of foreign policy was better at promoting democracy?
- Did the New Deal save or destroy America's free enterprise system?
- Was the Civil Rights Movement successful in achieving equality in America?
- Did the U.S. actions, from 1945 1991, at home and abroad, support the United States democratic principles?
- Was the US involvement in the Vietnam War necessary?
- Why did the Cold War end?
- Is the world safer today than during the Cold War?
