Course Description: This course will examine the United States government and engage students in the civic process. Students will study the foundations of the U.S. government including the U.S. Constitution and Bill of Rights, the branches and structure of government, and focus on the rights and responsibilities of citizenship and linkage institutions such as elections, media and interest groups. It is expected that students will engage in continual civic discourse where they are demonstrating their ability to understand varying opinions, diverse beliefs and cultural differences by demonstrating respect for self and others. They will gather, assess and analyze information to solve problems and take informed action. Presentations, debates and discussions are key components of this course. Students will complete Project Citizen, a civic engagement project, in which they will develop deeper connections with their voice, public policy and engage with the South Windsor community. This project may be finished outside of normal class hours. Additionally, students will apply their knowledge to research a contemporary governmental issue at the local, state, or national level.

Vision of the Successful Student And Core Competencies: The successful student will develop an appreciation for citizenship, engage in the study of civic processes, rules, and laws; examine civic and political institutions; and apply civic virtues and democratic principles. Collaboration, critical analysis, consistency and good study habits will enhance student success.
